In India, a rape every 15 minutes

RAPES IN INDIA: 94% OFFENDERS KNOWN TO VICTIM, EVERY 4TH VICTIM A MINOR



In India, a rape is reported every 15 minutes, according to recently released official government crime data. The National Crime Records Bureau (NCRB) data has stark revelations about crime in the country. Crimes against women are often taken less seriously, and investigated by police lacking in sensitivity, Women's rights groups said. To begin with, both men and women are unaware of the various forms of sexual as-

sault. For many women, public transport is the only means to travel and with a large part of residents still relying on public modes of transport, it causes overcrowding, making women commuters more vulnerable. According to a survey of women living across Indian cities, nearly four out of five of them faced harassment in public places, a lot of these forms do not involve skin-to-skin contact. Singh listed the following forms of sexual

assault: "Pinching, groping, looking down one's shirt, any kind of inappropriate sexual contact, catcalling, looking up one's skirt. While a few are more likely to happen in crowded spaces, others may occur at any public space." Ms. Kanimozhi Mathi, a Chennai High Court advocate, tells women's day special webinar in BIHER University, "Often men do not even realize what is a violation. For women, it has been so naturalised

in their systems that if a man is touching her inappropriately in a bus or in a public place, she may normally try to move away a bit without raising her voice. We are dependent on the government entirely. In India, women harassment acts should feel that all women are physically protected as well as be very strong out with courage, she said. She gave the brief note about the Sec 509 states that whoever intends to

insult the modesty of any women, utters any word, makes any sound or gesture, or exhibits any object which intrudes upon the privacy of such woman shall be punished with imprisonment upto 3 yrs and fine. Domestic violence is not just violence against women, but the violence of human rights. Sec 304A Causing death by negligence, Whoever causes the death of any person by doing any rash or negligent act not amounting to culpable homicide, shall be punished with imprisonment of either description for a term which may extend to two years, or with fine, or with both. Sec 498A Husband or relative of husband of a woman subjecting her to cruelty. Whoever, being the husband or the relative of the husband of a woman, subjects such woman to cruelty shall be punished with imprisonment for a term which may extend to three years and shall also be liable to fine. The women's day Special webinar shared had a great interaction and knowledge. The government statistics understate the number of rapes as it is still considered taboo to report rape in some parts of India and because rapes that end in murder are counted purely as murders.
